Continuing Education Credits

Purpose

To share evidence based information in pain & symptom management and end of life care, along with communication tools to better care for patients with serious illness. At the conclusion of this activity, the participant will be able to:

- Manage the physical, psychological, and social causes of distress in life limited patients and their families.
- Distinguish the difference between palliative care & hospice and recognize the appropriate timing of each in the medical care of a patient with serious illness.
- Develop practical strategies for introducing discussions of a patient's end of life care plan.
- Develop practical techniques to improve advance care planning.
- · Cultivate approaches to working with diverse patient populations with different diseases in various settings.

Target Audience

Physicians, Physician Assistants, Nurse Practitioners, Pharmacists, Nurses, Nursing Home Administrators, Social Workers, Chaplains and other healthcare professionals interested in hospice, palliative care and/or issues related to serious illness.

Plenary Session 8:15 - 9:45 a.m.

Ronald Culberson - "Do It Well. Make it Fun. The Key to Success in Life, Death and Almost Everything in Between": Ron will share how seeking excellence while making the processes in life and work more fun, one can be more effective. He will also discuss managing stress more effectively by changing our perspective and seeing the humor in our life.

Plenary Session 10:00 - 11:00 a.m.

David Howell, JD, BSBA - "Arkansas Public Guardian: Care-giver Resource": Mr. Howell will review the uses of public guardianship in Arkansas, including who is eligible, the application process and alternatives to public guardianship.

Plenary Session 11:00 - 12:00 p.m.

Robin Devan, MD - "Conducting a Family Meeting": Dr. Devan will discuss knowledge and skills needed to successfully conduct a family meeting at the end of life. She will discuss "responding to emotions" and "techniques to approach conflict in families".

Concurrent Session 1:00 - 2:00 p.m.

Kimberly Curseen, MD - "Documenting to Eligibility": Dr. Curseen will review documentation techniques to benefit nurses, nurse practitioners and physicians including review of case studies and Palmetto "LCD" guidelines.

Michael Chandler, PharmD - "Review of Long-Acting Opioids": Dr. Chandler will give a review of long-acting opioids to increase the comfort level of those giving and prescribing them. He will review the reason for using long-acting opioids over short-term and describe medication safety.

Fanta Gibson, LMSW - "Social Service Documentation": Ms. Fanta will review the content of a psychosocial assessment including indicators of multicultural contexts. She will also review vocabulary to strengthen documentation for hospice eligibility as well as the importance of the social work and chaplain roles in the interdisciplinary team approach to providing comfort care to patient and family.

Concurrent Sessions 2:15 - 3:15 p.m.

Neal Wyatt, DO - "Skin I ssues at End of Life: Get the Skinny on the Skin": Dr. Wyatt will review common skin conditions at end of life and appropriate skin and wound treatment plans.

Kay Kirk, RN - "Hospice 101 & Palliative Care Nursing": Mrs. Kirk will present a basic to mid-level overview of hospice and palliative car services and eligibility requirements. She will also discuss the different aspects that affect a persons quality of life.

Jennifer Durbin, RN - "Generational Differences in Health Care - Do they Matter?":

Ms. Durbin will describe the different generations in the healthcare system today, events that have affected them, and how these events influence their choices and response to healthcare.

Concurrent Session 3:45 - 4:45 p.m.

Lindsey Warford, PharmD - "Management of Constipation and Diarrhea" - Dr. Warford will identify patients at risk for constipation and diarrhea and review recommended treatments.

Angela Norman, DNP - "Dementia Caregiving at the End of Life": Ms. Norman will review the different types of dementia and their stages, as well as determining hospice eligibility. She will also educate regarding late stage caregiving for patients with dementia.

Tresa Hooks & Diane Morgan - "Veteran I ssues & Update": Ms. Hooks & Mrs. Morgan will provide information on the We Honor Veterans program, veteran eligibility for Aid and Attendance Benefit as well as VA burial/survivor benefits.

Plenary Session 8:15 - 9:45 a.m.

Keith Swetz, MD - "Heart Failure at End of Life": Dr. Swetz will discuss the hospice and palliative care role in heart failure. He will share AHA/ACC Decision Making Guidelines and will discuss goals of care in the setting of advanced heart failure, including symptom management strategies. He will also discuss recommendation for review annually of advance care planning.

Plenary Session 10:00 - 11:00 a.m.

Stacy Rudnicki, MD - "Palliative & Hospice Care for ALS Patients" - Dr. Rudnicki will review how ALS may present and progress, as well as the symptoms of ALS and management strategies for symptoms.

Plenary Session 11:00 - 12:00 p.m.

Jodiane Tritt - "Grassroots Advocacy: Why YOU are the Key to Success": Mrs. Tritt will describe how one can locate information about their elected officials, the legislative and administrative process, and how to effectively communicate with policy makers.

Concurrent Session 1:00 - 2:00 p.m.

Sarah Harrington, MD - "Palliative Care Program Development": Dr. Harrington will describe resources available and practical aspects of setting up a palliative care program, including how to integrate in to a hospital setting.

Lindsey Dayer, PharmD - "Adjuvant Pain Medication Review": Dr. Dayer will explain the concept behind "adjunct" medication and why they are used, different medications and how they work, and review case study examples.

Dianne Swaim, MDiv; Charles Saulsbery, PhD; Samantha Acklin, LSW, LPN; Misty Cullipher, LSW - Psycho-Social Roundtable Discussion (Social Work & Chaplain): Attendees will select a round-table discussion of their preference.

Concurrent Session 2:15-3:15 p.m.

Robert Lehmberg, MD - "Caring for Substance Abusers at End of Life": Dr. Lehmberg will educate and give practical skills to safely treat pain and other symptoms in this population. He will describe societal problems regarding opioid misuse and will give strategize to minimize harm.

Thomas Cunningham, PhD, MA, MS & Leah Eisenberg, JD, MA - "Ethics at End of Life": Dr. Cunningham and Ms. Eisenberg will educate to increase knowledge of basic principles of medical ethics and how to apply them in your professional practice.

Concurrent Session 3:45 - 4:45 p.m.

Jessica Joheim, MD - "Medication Review at End of Life" - Which medications should be continued/ discontinued when patients enroll in hospice? Dr. Joheim will focus discussion on working with patients and their families to streamline medications and ensure patient safety and comfort. The presentation will include discussion of the following meds (but not limited to): statins, blood thinners, diabetes and hypertension medications, etc.

Diane Swaim, MDiv - "The Many Faces of Grief": Mrs. Swaim will review the symptoms of grief and the factors affecting it. She will review the appropriate responses to individual experiences of grief and healing strategies when counseling those in mourning.

Sarah Harrington, MD - "Cancer Pain Management": Dr. Harrington will describe the causes/descriptions of cancer pain and their typical patterns, common side effects of medications used in cancer pain management, and will review case studies.
