The Mission of the Humboldt County Office of Education Court School is to provide an alternative educational program for at-risk students, in a safe and orderly environment, which shall:

- Promote student learning, self esteem, and respect for others;
- Assist them in reaching their academic, social and career goals;
- Offer them relevant learning experiences that are fun and empowering;
- Reinforce the development of a sense of personal responsibility and a positive work ethic;
- Accommodate and encourage all students' talents, strengths, personal promise, and perception of themselves as productive members of society.

Von Humboldt Court School provides an instructional alternative for Humboldt County Students who are wards of the court and remanded to custody by the judge because of at risk behaviors, mental health issues and crimes committed. A Teacher and Instructional Aide individualize an academic program for each student enrolled.

Von Humboldt Court School is located within the Humboldt County Juvenile Hall. Von Humboldt serves all incarcerated youth of the county in grades 3 through 12 with a highly individualized program for each student within a single classroom setting.

#### IX. Student Performance

The Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR) Program consists of several key components, including:

- California Standards Tests (CSTs), which include English-language arts (ELA) and mathematics in grades two through eleven; science in grades five, eight, and nine through eleven; and history-social science in grades eight, and nine through eleven.
- California Modified Assessment (CMA), an alternate assessment that is based on modified achievement standards in ELA for
  grades three through eleven; mathematics for grades three through seven, Algebra I, and Geometry; and science in grades five
  and eight, and Life Science in grade ten. The CMA is designed to assess those students whose disabilities preclude them from
  achieving grade-level proficiency on an assessment of the California content standards with or without accommodations.
- California Alternate Performance Assessment (CAPA), includes ELA and mathematics in grades two through eleven, and science
  for grades five, eight, and ten. The CAPA is given to those students with significant cognitive disabilities whose disabilities prevent
  them from taking either the CSTs with accommodations or modifications or the CMA with accommodations.

The assessments under the STAR Program show how well students are doing in relation to the state content standards. On each of these assessments, student scores are reported as performance levels.

# XII. Instructional Planning and Scheduling

#### **Professional Development**

This section provides information on the number of days provided for professional development and continuous professional growth in the most recent three year period. Questions that may be answered include:

In order to provide our students with quality instruction in all areas of the curriculum, our teachers are encouraged to actively participate in professional development classes offered by the Humboldt County Office of Education as well as outside agencies, such as CPI's Nonviolent Crisis Intervention training. Many staff attend an annual JCCASAC conference which focuses specifically on Court and Community Schools needs. During 2008-09 staff received professional development in the areas of Character Based Literacy and Step Up to Writing
