
#### SD\*JEM VISIT BURGATE

#### A-LEVEL GOV POL TRIP TO POLECONUK



Early on the morning of Monday 1 December, the assembled Burgate A level Government and Politics classes left behind the comfort and safety of the Sixth Form Centre and embarked on a daring expedition into Westminster, the heart of London's political epicentre, in the name of social justice, and political debate. They were heading for the PolEconUK conference in Westminster Central Hall, where some of the UK's biggest political names, from all main parties, were set to speak and answer to the toughest of questions. The torporific state of the students during the journey through traffic was lifted as soon as they stepped out into the bracing London air. Ready and eager for discourse of the highest order, they stepped into a world of grandeur: the opulent hall, filled with young intellectuals from all across the country, and from all academic backgrounds. The great hall, with its 2000+ capacity, was full to the brim. With the ever-changing political battleground, and impending bombshell of the General Election, the Burgate GovPol posse were fired up and ready for verbal combat, notepads at the ready. Soon after The Burgate's representatives arrived, at 1100 hours, the conference began. The talks began with a sombre introduction as the hall paid tribute to the late great Tony Benn. After a relatively gentle introduction by 'Mr Speaker' John Bercow MP, who talked largely about his efforts to reform the House of Commons, things began to heat up as William Hague MP took the stage. The light from the chandeliers shone on his head and his inimitable voice boomed around the chamber, while the soon-to-retire Hague defended the Conservatives with vigour and condemned the opposition. But then the day's undeniable climax, the arrival of Nigel Farage MEP, UKIP leader, who was greeted (in his own words) with a combination of "cheers and jeers"; hard-hitting questions ensued, criticising Farage's anti-establishment stance and the possible ramifications of UKIP. Nevertheless Farage spoke with his usual charisma, and aroused chuckles from all, including the typically professional and solemn Mr Cross. Further speakers included the dashing young Tristram Hunt MP, shadow Education Secretary; Simon Hughes MP, Minister of Justice, who boldly spoke in support of the EU; Rachel Reeves, Labour MP; and Nadine Dorries, famous for being the first voted out on I'm a Celebrity 2012. Although the sheer size of the audience, and time constraints, prevented the Burgate Crew from challenging any of the political figures, all students were deeply and intensely involved in the action. Pupils soaked up the knowledge that was on display, and took full awareness of the discussions, often with a strong understanding of the current political context. It is safe to say that all present did The Burgate School and Sixth Form proud.
