approximate (adjective) almost exact or correct - (verb) to come close to; to be nearly the same as	approximation (noun)	The <u>approximate</u> size of my bedroom is ten feet by twelve feet. The sugar substitute <u>approximated</u> the taste of real sugar. The statue was barely an <u>approximation</u> of the queen's beauty.
2. <u>assumption</u> (noun) something that is accepted as true without proof; the act of taking on or taking over	<u>assume</u> (verb)	The <u>assumption</u> that toads cause warts is false. A grand ceremony marked the <u>assumption</u> of power by the new king. I <u>assume</u> you will wear a coat in this cold weather.
3. certify (verb) to guarantee or confirm to be true, accurate, or genuine - to issue a license or certificate indicating that certain standards have been met	<u>certification</u> (noun)	The building inspector certified that the apartment met city requirements. The state board of education certifies teachers. The certification test for accountants involves math.
4. <u>contend</u> (verb) to struggle against difficulties - to compete - to claim	contention (noun) contentious (adjective) contender (noun)	Every day, the ill patient must contend with his disease. The two teams contended for the debate championship. The expert's contention was that the work of art is not by Picasso. Three contenders competed for the prize.

5. <u>hypothesis</u> (noun) a theory; an educated guess that can be tested by further	hypothesize (verb)	The results of the experiments supported the scientist's hypothesis .
investigation		Physicists <u>hypothesized</u> that there were undiscovered particles within atoms.
6. <u>illusion</u> (noun) an image that is not real - an idea that is mistaken or false	<u>illusory</u> (adjective)	Is that puddle in the road ahead real, or is it just an illusion?
		The karate student soon got over the illusion that he could defeat his teacher in a contest.
		Although we remain hopeful, world peace has so far proved illusory .
7. inevitable (adjective) impossible to avoid or prevent	<u>inevitability</u> (noun)	Growing older is <u>inevitable</u> .
	(110011)	Disagreement between people is an <u>inevitability</u> .
8. inquire (verb) to ask - request information	<u>inquiry</u> (noun)	We called the hotel to inquire about the rates.
		The personnel office made inquiries about his recent job performance.
9. <u>presume</u> (verb) to take for granted as being true without having proof	presumption (noun)	We <u>presumed</u> there would be no word problems on the math test, but we were mistaken.
		In U.S. trials, there is a presumption of innocence until guilt is proven.
10. <u>vague</u> (adjective) not specific - not clear - lacking definite form	vagueness (noun)	Because of Cal's vague directions, we got lost.
		I saw the vague shadow of an animal through the fog.
		Because of the <u>vagueness</u> of the directions, we got lost.
