Better Training for Safer Food is an initiative of the European Commission aimed at organising an EU training strategy in the areas of food law, feed law.

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1. GENERAL INFORMATION ON THE TRAINING

1.1 Objectives

The Better Training for Safer Food (BTSF) is the European Commission's initiative from Directorate General for Health and Consumers (DG SANCO), managed by the Consumers, Health and Food Executive Agency (CHAFEA), aiming to organize EU budget founded trainings in the areas of food and feed law, plant and animal health, and animal welfare rules.

This aims to keep participants up-to-date with EU law in these areas and should help to ensure more harmonized and efficient controls. Efficient controls are an essential factor in maintaining high levels of consumer protection, animal health and plant health. Harmonization of controls should help to create a level playing field for food businesses.

Training is also organized specifically for third country participants so as to familiarize them with EU requirements.

The objective of the present programme is to spread the knowledge and best practices for the implementation and control of animal identification, registration and traceability.

The targeted audience is official staff of Competent Authorities carrying out inspection on animal identification, registration and traceability and/or being involved in the design, management and operation of animal identification, registration and traceability systems.

Participants will be required to participate actively in the debriefing, discussions and group works.

1.2 Subjects covered

The programme will offer a total of 10 four-day training courses covering relevant aspects of animal identification, registration and traceability:

1.4 Project Management

ADT Projekt GmbH together with its subcontractor the Institut de l'Elevage will be in charge of the organisation of the 10 training events. 2. SELECTION PROCESS

2.1 Invited countries

The present training programme is open to EU Member States, EFTA-EEA countries, Candidate Countries, ENP countries, Mediterranean countries and other selected Third countries

The expected attendance is 280 trainees over the 2 years of project globally. For the purpose of mixing trainees of different origins in each session, a comprehensive indicative table of invited countries per session is provided in Annex 1 which is summarized in the following overview:

2.2 Selection criteria

The training programme is open to participants whose application was received from the BTSF National Contact Points of their country — trough the selection process described hereunder.

The profiles of the applicants should respect the following criteria:

- **First priority** shall be given to officials involved in carrying out inspection of animal identification & registration objects at livestock farms, livestock markets, animal traders, slaughter houses etc.
- **Second priority** shall be given to officials of national competent authorities responsible for the design, management and operation of animal identification, registration and traceability activities in their countries
- Third priority shall be given to other officials involved in design, management and operation of animal identification, registration and traceability activities in their countries (staff of other national and regional units for animal identification, registration and traceability within the public administration or mandated bodies).

Moreover all participants shall be:

- Preferably in the position to disseminate the knowledge acquired during the workshop within the national competent authority, governmentand mandated bodies.
- **Proficient in the English language**. No interpretation service will be provided during the training sessions.

Priority will be given to the applications received before the datelines, from the countries invited in the session. However to ensure some flexibility in the application process, candidates from the reserve lists might be accepted in each session.

The Project Manager will observe that these criteria are met. Any doubt with regards to the selection criteria can be addressed to the Project Manager under 2013-96-03-Animal-IRT@adt.de.

2.3 Process to be followed

The selection process is carried out jointly by the National Contact Point of the beneficiary country and the Event Manager.

Each country has an expected number of participants per event, and the place must be allocated. Should there be vacancies, those should be communicated as soon as possible, in order to reallocate the seat to another country.

Tasks entrusted upon the NCPs:

- a) Consider the **number of participants** to be supported by the project at each training, according to the information provided by the Event Manager (see Annex 1 of this brochure)
- b) **Distribute the information** to the relevant national institutions and government bodies about the training course
- c) Select participants complying with the above mentioned selection criteria and request them to return a registration form with a short Curriculum Vitae (CV) using the templates provided
- d) **Send the registration forms** and CVs to the Event Manager at the latest by the dates indicated in section 2.5 for the relevant training and ensuring that the recommendations are followed
- e) Send **additional registration forms** for the reserve list to the Event Manager.

Tasks of the Event Manager:

The Event Manager (EM), together with the Project Manager, will draw the attention of the NCPs on the need for the CVs of the proposed participants to comply at the best with the selection criteria. It is therefore advisable to make sure that CVs accurately reflect the adequacy of the profile on the participants with the selection criteria. Once the participant has been accepted and

communicated to NCP the participant will directly be contacted in order to make further logistic arrangements and to give him further detailed information.

3.2 Support provided by the project

Travel

One month before the training, registered participants will be contacted by the Event Manager/Travel agency in order to arrange their trip to the training location. For each supported participant the project will provide a return flight ticket (in economy class) or a return train ticket (in first class) using the most direct route. Participants coming by car will be refund on the basis of the return train ticket in 1st class.

For participants from third countries the project will also reimburse visa costs upon provision of the original receipts by the participants for the incurred expenses.

Upon arrival transfer from the airport or station to the hotel will be arranged by the Event Manager, as well as the transfer from the training site to the airport on the last day of the training.

Health of insurance should be managed and covered by the country of the participant, because it would be extremely difficult to manage it from another country and surely much more expensive. In addition, it will be up to each participant to request, if needed, his European Health Insurance Card from his/her insurance company before attending to a training session.

Accommodation

The project will provide full-board accommodation for subsided trainees for the period of the training. Resident meeting package will cover the following:

- Room charge from day 1 to day 5 (single occupation / 4 nights)
- Catering on the 1st day (arrival day): lunch for participants arriving before 12:00, afternoon coffee break, welcome drink and dinner
- on the 2nd and the 4th day of the training: full board accommodation including breakfast, 2 coffee breaks, lunch, dinner
- on the 3rd day/field day: breakfast, lunch and dinner
- on the 5th day (departure day): breakfast, 1 coffee break and lunch (depending on the departure time)
- Airport Transfers (Airport-Hotel-Airport)
- Wireless Internet connection in the Hotel

No "per diem" or "pocket money" will be distributed to participants in addition to what is indicated here above. All personal expenses such as local transports, minibar, laundry, room services and extra drinks/meals will be charged to the participants by the hotel.



3.3 Location of the sessions

A total of 4 training sites have been identified in four different EU Member States.



Lyon (France)

The 6th training event will be held in Lyon, France from 2nd to 6th March 2015. Lyon is the second-largest city in France and the capital of the region Rhône-Alpes. Lyon is France's second major economic, industrial, commercial and political centre and a major transportation hub for Europe. The location has been chosen for its broad experience with complex animal identification, registration and traceability systems and long experience with electronic identification of animals.

Arrival: Lyon international airport can reached by plane and Lyon disposes also of a TGW railway station and can therefore also easily reached by train. Each participant will be met at the airport and transported to the hotel. If possible

participants arriving with different flights will be grouped and transported together upon arrival.

Accommodation will be arranged in 2015 at the Hotel Quality Suites Lyon 7 Lodge. This 4-star hotel is situated between Lyon city centre and the meeting venue Agrapole in the quarter Jean Macé close to the river Rhone.

Training venue: The meeting room in Lyon at this training session is not situated within the hotel but is reserved at the training centre Agrapole

The 7th training in Warsaw, Poland, is scheduled from 4th to 8th May 2015. Warsaw is the capital of Poland where the Competent Authority for the identification of bovine, ovine and caprine animal is based. Poland has a broad range of livestock production systems (small, medium, large scale) and is an interesting site for its border to non-EU-countries.

Arrival: Warsaw is well connected and reachable by train, plane and car. The participants will be met at the airport and transported to the hotel which is situated only 9 km away from the airport and less than 2 km from the central train station.

Accommodation in Warsaw will be arranged at Novotel Warszawa Centrum hotel or another 4-star hotel situated in the heart of the city, 5 minutes from the main train station. The hotel offers free WIFI as well as a fully equipped conference center, which is perfect for large conferences and intimate meetings.

Training venue: The meeting facilities within the hotel offer a complete range of solutions for events and conferences with appropriate meeting space. For group work the hotel offers smaller conference cabinets or working groups can use the lobby of the hotel.

Accomodation will be arranged at the Novotel Lisboa. The 4-star Novotel Lisboa hotel is located in the city of Lisbon, just 10 and 5 minutes' walk respectively from Lisbon Zoo and the Calouste Gulbenkian Foundation. With various public transport facilities close at hand, the historic city center is just 10 minutes away. The Novotel Lisboa hotel also has a swimming pool, fitness center, restaurant, bar and garage.

Arrival: Munich is easily reachable by train and plane. The airport Munich is about 40 km from the city centre. Every participant will be met at the airport and

transported to the hotel which is located in the Eastern surroundings of Munich about 30 km from Munich airport.

Accommodation will be arranged at Hotel Stangl, a very traditional Bavarian 4-stars hotel on the countryside of Munich. However, Munich city center can be reached by local transport in about 30 minutes. The 56 rooms are typically furnished in Bavarian style but offer modern equipment.
