Cost of dropping out of school to productivity

The Conference Board of Canada reports that “using actuarial methods that include estimates of lost productivity, lower civic participation and increases in health care utilization, Lafleur calculated that the cost to Canadians of all children dropping out of school in 1989 would, over their lifetimes, total \$4 billion. This is an estimate based on just one year’s dropout rate. Over a decade the costs and losses to Canadian society would be extraordinary.”

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The Family Education Centre helps parents help their children make better choices and problem solve, and increase their ability to deal with conflict, power struggles and anger.

I have enjoyed working with the principals and parent council chairs on this project and and I look forward to FEC providing them with some outstanding workshops.

Parenting Middle Aged Children (7-12)

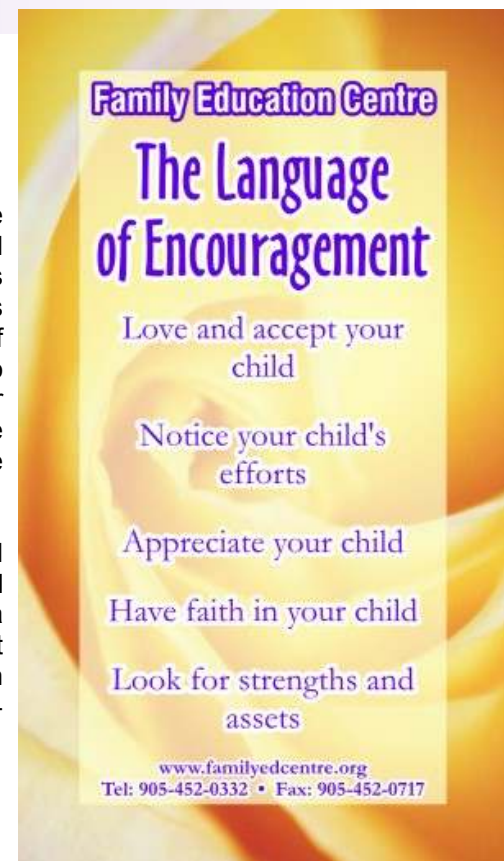
Our Family Futures Parenting Middle Age Children's Program Pilot is underway!!! We began in late January with 8 referred parents and 15 children. Parenting Middle Aged Children is a concurrent parenting and children's program (ages 7-12) run in partnership with the Boys & Girls Club of Peel exclusively for CAS families.

We are running our usual Raising Responsible Children curriculum for the parents with some enhancements: on March 17th we have Peel Police coming in to do a presentation on Safety, specifically Internet, Home Alone and Street Smart and on April 7th we have Peel Health coming in to present on Bullying. Please note that we can open these special presentations to our own Parent Educators/Board/Staff Members. If you are interested in attending, please call Paula Nunes-Haggett at 905-452-0332 x225 to make arrangements.

For the middle aged children (7-12) portion, the Boys & Girls Club enlisted three Youth Workers and three volunteers. We divide the children into two groups (7-9 and 10-12) to facilitate age appropriate activities. The children are enjoying coming out on Monday evenings for their program – they stay busy with crafts, games, and themed discussions and skill-building around topics such as bullying, dealing with anger and safety. We have also hired a Child Development Worker from BNRC to provide child-minding services as two of our families have younger siblings who are not quite ready yet to join the Boys & Girls Club activities. It's a busy program!

If you're wondering how we are managing to run separate activities with three groups of children plus a group of adults, it's all happening through the Boys & Girls Club and the incredible support of the Principal of St. Anne Elementary School in Brampton. The premises are second to none and we have full use of the staff room (including great kitchen facilities), the library, small gym (so they call it but it is actually quite large) and a classroom.

Although the Parenting Middle Aged Children's Program is running as a pilot and is still in its early stages, it is off to a FANTASTIC START and we are confident it will be prove to get better as we continue.



Report on the Social Determinants of Health and Middle Childhood

The United Nations Association of Canada (2007) released a report on the Social Determinants of Health and Middle Childhood in Canada. "Talking Back to Grownups: Health Children, Healthy Communities" reports on the perceptions and priorities which exist around the health of children (age 9-12), showcases the social determinants of health that are having the largest impact on children's lives (e.g., parental involvement and attachment to the community), and provides recommendations for tackling health disparities from a population health perspective.

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ONTARIO DOCTORS CALL FOR BAN ON SMOKING IN CARS WITH CHILDREN

Ontario physicians are calling for a ban on smoking in vehicles where children are present based on recent data that shows accumulation of second-hand smoke particles is greater in vehicles than indoors (CBC, 2008, February 15). Dr. Janice Willett, the president of the Ontario Medical Association, explained that "we now have evidence showing the harmful levels of second-hand smoke in a car are even more potent than we once believed... These important findings should be heard by both caregivers who smoke and our lawmakers so that children can be protected" (CBC, 2008, February 15).
