Do you eBird?

eBird is a free, web-based tool for sharing your bird observations, and is revolutionizing how citizen scientists contribute to our knowledge of birds. Currently, there are large geographic and species gaps within eBird for the state of Montana. To fill in these gaps, Kate Stone and Eric Rasmussen from MPG Ranch challenge you to share more of your observations. Our goal is to promote and incentivize eBird use in Montana. We will have fun prizes for monthly challenges and the eBirder with the most species and most counties at the end of the year. Important Bird Areas

Birds are on the Move! Spring migration is underway and our local IBAs provide much needed habitat.

On March 15th eighteen ardent birders from Bozeman and Ennis braved the Madison Valley winds to survey the Madison Valley IBA. We were rewarded with sightings of some of the early migrants coming back: Sandhill Cranes, Western Meadowlarks, Mountain Bluebirds, Killdeers, 3 surprisingly early Tree Swallows and hundreds of migrating ducks, geese and swan that find a welcome stop-over on Ennis Lake. Altogether 3,825 individuals of 47 species were counted in a few short hours. If you are interested in putting your birding skills to use to monitor our Important Bird Areas (good birding is guaranteed!) join some of the next IBA surveys listed below:

How does a Birdathon Work?

A Birdathon is similar to a walk-a-thon, but instead of collecting pledges per mile walked, you spend a great spring day outdoors with fellow birders. The challenge is to identify as many bird species as possible within a 24 hour period from May 16 – June 28, 2015. You collect pledges per bird species and the money raised benefits Southwestern Montana birds and other wildlife.

How Can You Participate in the Birdathon?

Participation is easier: You don't have to be an expert - some people even do Birdathons by counting the visitors to their feeder. Others cover dozens of miles in a day, racking up over 100 species. The key to Birdathon is to have fun!

- ➤ **Join a Team:** Contact the Birdathon Committee, we have birdathon teams that would love for you to join them.
- Form a Team: Get a few of your birding friends together and schedule a 24 hour period to go birding. Contact us for a Birdathon Kit and register your team. (see registration form on back for details)
- ➤ Take a Business "Bird Break": Trade in your briefcase for binoculars, grab co-workers and count birds on your lunch hour! Awards & Prizes Categories

There Are Many Prizes – check out our website for more details

- ➤ **Most Species Identified:** This award recognizes the team that identifies the most species in a 24-hour period. All members of the team must see or hear 95% of the birds reported.
- ➤ Most Money Raised: This award recognizes the team that raises the highest total dollar amount in donations.
- > Most Pledges Collected: This award recognizes the team that solicits the highest number of individual pledges.
- > Most Species in a Half Day: This award recognizes the team that identifies the most species in a 6 hour period.
- > **Best Bird Award:** This award recognizes the team that records the "best" bird as determined by an outside judge. This could be a rare bird for a specific habitat or a bird that is difficult to find in its habitat.
- ➤ **Raptor Award:** This award recognizes the team that sees the most Raptors on their Birdathon Day. Count all Hawks, Falcons, Eagles, Ospreys and Vultures.
- > Montana Audubon Award: This award recognizes the team that sees the most Magpies on their Birdathon Day
- > Important Bird Area (IBA) Sighting Award: This award recognizes the team that observes the most bird species in Montana IBAs. The Team Report submitted must indicate on which IBAs the birds were seen.
- ➤ **Sitting Duck Award:** This award is given to the team whose members identify the highest number of species while staying within an imaginary circle 200 feet in diameter during their count.
- > Carbon Neutral Award: This award is given to the team who is the most energy efficient or has the smallest carbon footprint.
- ➤ **Mentor Award:** Each Team Leader will be entered for a prize.
- **Rookie Award:** If you're new to birdwatching you will be eligible for a prize at the awards celebration

the around corner and Big Sky Bird Rescue is bracing for the inevitable arrival o f dozens o f injured and orphaned

songbirds. According to Mava Hurd, director of the local non-profit organization, the arrival of spring brings with it numerous exhausted and worn down migrants. Some of these birds, such as the common nighthawk, travel for more than 6000 miles to spend the summer months in Montana.

Shortly after the adults arrive, baby season is off and flying. Hurd explains that baby songbirds can be the most difficult and time consuming to rehabilitate. Though baby birds are the most work for rehabilitators, they are often the most rewarding. "Nestling
