PRINTMAKERS ALIVE AND WELL AT ARTEAST BY TED JOHNSTON

Three Arteast printmakers teamed up to exhibit their respective works at the HeARTwood Gallery. Over 70 images by Joan Crate, Marion Hall, and Ted Johnston were on display for the month of September under the theme "3 Printmakers – 3 Styles".

Each artist has a separate and distinct style that viewers at the well-attended opening found exciting and pleasing. Sales were brisk, to the delight of the artists. "It was a very large display for the room," said Ted Johnston, "but surprisingly the variety of work made it comfortable to view."

Marion Hall's prints were mostly monotypes created from gelatin plates using found plant materials. In the spirit of making lemonade when life hands you lemons, Marion presented several works, including an edition of multi-viscosity etchings, in which she explored the use of pale swallow-wort, also known as dogstrangling vine, an vigorously invasive species that she has been trying to clear from her garden.

Joan Crate exhibited prints using a variety of techniques such as reduction wood cuts, linocuts and etchings; many of her images were inspired by her travels in Newfoundland and the Maritime provinces.

Ted Johnston's wood and lino cuts inspired by urban architecture were accompanied by a new series of scenes drawn from military action in Iraq and Afghanistan, as well as a whimsical "Bubble Boys" series, some of which would be familiar to those who recollect the "Guilty Pleasures" show at Gloucester Gallery in the spring.

DREAMING IN COLOUR BY BERNARD POIRIER

As a new Arteast member, it was a pleasure for me to attend my first Arteast vernissage and witness the talent of my fellow volunteers.

Thirty three volunteers receive the President's invitation to submit works and 19 volunteers have 30 works of art demonstrating their interpretations of "Dreaming in Colour".

There is colour. One work of art bore the title of "Waiting for the Rainbow" and indeed the title spoke eloquently of the colours presented for many to see. Our members are no doubt already familiar with the two aspects so important to the world of visual

arts—the colours themselves in their medium of watercolours, oils, pastels, pencil acrylic, ink and so on and then the manner in which they are presented. Therein lies the variety and imagination that makes any exhibition unique. This one is no different. The number of volunteers invited, as mentioned before, is an indication of the interest to be found in this group and the love of this medium of self expression is evident.

The community should be proud of the talent exhibited along with the quality of work which in turn would no doubt be an attraction for our young and amateur population to discover in themselves. Also, it must not be forgotten that one never stops learning what to do or what not to do as it applies to one's own style and medium. There is always much to learn, and finding out what to look for is an experience in itself. All of this is reflected in the subject matter, the composition and the use of the medium which has so much effect on style.

To all of you who did not have the chance of seeing what "Dreaming in Colour" is like, we hope you will mark the next vernissage on your calendar to come out and support your fellow members. The next vernissage is Sunday October 21, at VACO for the Art and Photo juried exhibit.

WE ASKED AND YOU TOLD US BY SUZANNE BEAULIEU

As part of our strategic planning activities that have been happening since the Fall of 2006, we conducted a member survey in May.

We wanted input from the membersat-large in 3 specific areas :

- 1. Where do you want meetings to be held once VACO moves to the new Arts facility?
- 2. What programming activities would you like to see more of?
- 3. What can Arteast do for you in the next 5 years?

We invited you to two focus groups (one in English and one in French). We also asked you to let us know online what direction you would like us to head in. A few questionnaires were also handed out to members at the May meeting.

A total of 20 questionnaires were completed and returned.

On the question of future location (venue), 70% ranked the new arts facility as their first choice. 60% ranked Gloucester high schools or the Gloucester Library as their first or second choice.

On the question of geographic location, 45% of members ranked an Orléans location east of Jeanne d'Arc as a #1 or #2 choice whereas 75% ranked a location west of Jeanne d'Arc or the former Gloucester area as their #1 or #2 preference.

In the programming section of the questions, responses endorsed the good work that the programming coordinators are currently doing. Developing technical skills, art history topics, 'show and tell' and critiques all received a #1 or #2 ranking by 50% of respondents. Our plein air outings seemed popular as well and some new ideas that we may explore in the next few years.

Looking ahead to the next 5 years, many members commented that they like what we are doing now and asked for more of the same by being supportive and encouraging to all levels of artists. Several members stated the importance of being diverse and welcoming to all. Some also underscored the importance of encouraging beginners.

Several members commented on their interest in exhibitions and the

increased availability of gallery space or more shows in larger areas.

Many mentioned the importance of the "Grow with art program" and to keep it diversified with many different topics.

Three members asked that there be a bit more French and continue trying to offer bilingual services whenever possible.

A couple of members mentioned that they look to Arteast to help them keep doing art.

A couple of other members asked for more opportunities to paint together.

Other excellent ideas and comments were received from individuals and have been noted by the Executive. A working group will start looking at all the input of the last year and take this forward to the next phase of strategic planning. We will continue to keep you posted.

Thank you to all those who took the time to give us your input. We appreciated your excellent feedback and positive comments.



LIBRARY HANGINGS BY TED JOHNSTON

For both budding and flowering artists, there is opportunity for exposure at the east end libraries. Arteast has a standing agreement with the Blackburn Hamlet, North Gloucester and Orleans libraries to exhibit members' works throughout the year. Membership in Arteast is the basic requirement and works presented must be ready for hanging. There is no formal jurying to be represented.

Because of its limited space, the Blackburn Hamlet Library is usually a one-person show and is booked well in advance. Openings are now being booked for April/May 2008 and beyond. "That shouldn't deter members from making a proposal to me," says Lynda Mathieson, the Blackburn Hamlet coordinator, "because a one person show takes time to prepare and there is always the possibility of a scheduled artist dropping out."

The other two libraries rotate their exhibits on the first Tuesday of every other month. Mari Brown and Maureen Mitchell are the new coordinators at Orleans, replacing Aline Joanis. Their new show has just gone up and will be on display until November 6. At the North Gloucester Library, October 2 is the changeover

date and works will remain in place until December 3. Ted Johnston now manages the NGL site, having succeeded Linda Bordage.

A notice is sent out in advance of each changeover to remind artists to retrieve works in place and to invite new works for exhibiting. The Orleans and North Gloucester Libraries have considerable space available so more than one painting, sketch, or photograph can usually be accepted. The final decision is made on take-in day by the coordinators when they know how many pieces they have to work with. The coordinators and the Librarian retain the right to decide on the suitability of works for public display.

Members are reminded that putting the works on the wall is just one step. Most artists are looking to sell their work and that needs people to see them. Encourage your family, friends and neighbours to visit the library for these interesting art shows by members of the local community. The only cost is a few minutes of their time and the experience may be lifechanging!

Our next juried exhibition at the Gloucester Gallery is being extended to the Cumberland Gallery also. Thanks to a kind offer from the City of Ottawa, we accepted the challenge to fill both spaces with Arteast's members' talent.

The challenge is now yours to start painting so that we have a memorable exhibition in the Spring. The theme is "Time of Renewal". For this show only, there will be no size limitations just as long as the volunteers can lift the work!

So don't wait until the March 1 jurying date to start painting for this event! Forms will be available online and with your newsletter early in the new year.

from Helena's creativity, design savvy, professionalism and attention to detail. She has prepared bilingual promotional materials that describe the events for this coming year. On seeing the beautiful full-colour drafts of this material, the executive unanimously approved the spending of part of the City of Ottawa grant to print 5000 copies. These materials will be made available to the public at community centres, libraries, art galleries, art supply shops and other locations throughout the year, so that interested members of the public can learn about and benefit from our *Grow with Art* activities.

The *Grow with Art* team would like to thank Helena Guzman-Field for her excellent work. We also thank the numerous Arteast members who provided images to adorn the flyer and poster. Many thanks also are due to Patricia Fish, Suzanne Beaulieu and Carmen Dufault for their help in translation and proofreading, as well as others who provided helpful suggestions throughout the process of developing these materials.

The *Grow with Art* team would also like to thank Joan Crate, one of our newer members, for filling in at the last minute at our September 25 meeting. When we received word that Mr. Avi Singh was unable to join us due to a death in the family, Joan kindly agreed to present some of her recent experiences in printmaking. With only a few hours advance notice, she pulled together an interesting selection of her prints, which she used to illustrate a fascinating, informal talk on various printmaking techniques. That evening, members also had the opportunity to experiment with printing from gelatin plates.

Gelatin plates for printmaking

As requested, here is the recipe for gelatin: 2 rounded tablespoons of plain cooking gelatin 1 cup cold water

Yield: 1 cup of printing gelatin (enough for approximately $5'' \times 6'' \times 1/2''$).

Put the water into a saucepan. Sprinkle the gelatin into the water. Heat the water slowly, stirring slowly, avoiding bubbles, until the water goes clear. Pour the gelatin into a mold. Leave the mold overnight to set. Caution: Do not pour excess cooked gelatin down the drain because it will clog.
