Advent Brings in the New Year for the Church

We forget sometimes that January First has not always been New Years Day and still is not in some settings. Until the middle of the eighteenth century, at least in the United Kingdom and therefore in her North American Colonies, March 25th was considered the beginning of the New Year. Some businesses and institutions work on a fiscal calendar that begins on a day other than January first. Most of us are aware that our Jewish and Chinese friends have a different date for the new year than the one in our secular calendars. So, it is no surprise that the Church keeps her new year on a different date. For the liturgy, New Years Day is the First Sunday in Advent.

Advent is our season of preparation to remember the first coming of our Lord Jesus Christ and to open our hearts to his second coming in Glory to complete the work begun by his death and resurrection. Though I do not indulge in wild speculations about when that coming might be, I do still believe that at some point in history the Risen Lord will return in Glorious Majesty to judge the living and the dead and transform human existence forever so that God's will is done on earth as it is in heaven. I also believe that in the course of our spiritual lives Jesus comes to us in ways that are transforming, so much so that they are almost like small anticipatory moments of second coming. And, of course, I am convinced that our

Bishop Curry Responds to House of Bishops Statement

Brothers and Sisters,

The Statement of the House of Bishops of the Episcopal Church responding to the requests, questions and concerns addressed to us, by the Primates of the Anglican Communion is a significant accomplishment, a positive step, and a hopeful sign.

Our statement was crafted after two days in prayer and conversation with the Archbishop of Canterbury and other leaders of the Anglican Communion. It follows two days of work and worship in New Orleans and Mississippi to support the work of rebuilding by the church and

Lord comes to greet us at the moment of death, so that we cross that great divide without fear and enter into the eternal life God has prepared for those who love him

Advent will be a particular time of new beginning all over the Episcopal Church. The Revised Common Lectionary becomes the official list of readings for Sundays and Major Holy Days on Advent One. This lectionary is based on the one that we have followed for years with our current prayer book. The original Common Lectionary was an ecumenical production with Roman Catholics, Anglicans, Lutherans, Presbyterians and Methodists playing a key role in its compilation. The revision of the lectionary was undertaken by an equally diverse team of scholars committed to the idea that as many Christians as possible should hear the same lessons read in their churches on Sunday.

Changes were made in several areas. Some of the epistle lessons were changed so that they made more sense when read in conjunction with the Sunday Gospel. Over the years those of us who have preached the Common Lectionary have complained sometimes the Gospel lessons seemed to have been arbitrarily cut short, leaving out the meatiest parts of the scripture. To correct that problem, many of the Gospel lessons have been lengthened. The most noticeable change will be in the Old Testament lessons. During the Green Seasons of the year, there will be more choices in the Old Testament.

Many of the great stories of the Old Testament, missing from the Common Lectionary are now included as optional choices to be read. It is hoped that the careful use of the wider choice of Old Testament lessons will deepen congregational understanding of the Jewish roots of the Gospel story and give a fuller appreciation of the presence of God in the workings of the history of the Jewish Nation.

These changes have resulted in some practical needs. We have purchased two new Gospel Books. One will be used on Sundays in place of the current, now superseded gospel book. The other will be inserted into the brass ceremonial gospel cover to replace the gospel book now in it. The old gospel books will be preserved in the bookcases of the Ingle Parlor, where the historic service books of this parish are now kept. The preservation of these books is important for two reasons. They are memorials and the memory of those for whom they were given will thus be preserved. Then, they remain part of the history of the parish. Another decision that I have taken as rector is to place a large type Lectionary with the Sunday Lessons and Psalm for each week on the Eagle Lectern. At present we have a wonderful large Bible on the Lectern. Should lay readers forget the copy of the lections sent to them prior to the service, said readers must look them up in the Bible (which I think is not such a bad thing) and read it. The potential problem is that the Bible currently on the lectern is not the same translation this parish Prior to my arrival, the parish made a decision to use the New Revised Standard Version Bible for the Sunday readings. Our lectern Bible is the old Revised Standard Version. lectionary book is in the New Revised Standard Version. However, the lectern Bible will not be tucked away. Because I believe that a church should have a Bible in a prominent place in the church, I will move the Bible to the pulpit where it will continue to be on public display and available for public reading.

I also plan to introduce another enrichment to the liturgy derived from the historic tradition of the church. It was the custom in ancient times, and still is in some parishes, to mark the Third

Sunday in Advent and the Third Sunday in Lent with Rose Colored Vestments. In the days when Advent and Lenten disciplines were much more rigorous than they are today, those two Sundays were set apart as days when the fast kept could be broken and a hearty meal taken to build up one's strength for the keeping of the rest of the season. Both were commonly called Rose Sundays, the one in Lent was also called Mothering Sunday and was kept as day when one ought to visit one's own mother and the Cathedral of the Diocese (if it has one) as the mother church of the diocese. I have owned a Rose Chasuble and Stole. which were custom made for me in England, for a number of years and used said vestments on the Rose Sundays in my previous parish. As they were my personal property, they came with me to Henderson. We are fortunate that they match some of the embroidery on both our Blue Advent and Purple Lenten hangings. I look forward to putting them back into use.

We enter a season of expectation and hope. It is a time of new beginnings as we start a new liturgical year. Come, worship the Lord in the Beauty of Holiness, that when we arrive at the celebration of his birth, we may with pure hearts come and adore him. †

We use Prayer B during Christmas and Epiphany because of its special emphasis on the Incarnation or coming in human flesh of our Lord Jesus Christ

.... community there after hurricane Katrina.

The result was that bishops holding different perspectives on the issues before us were able to find common ground. The statement was approved by a nearly unanimous vote of those present and participating. I am aware of only one bishop who was unable to vote in the affirmative. Liberals, conservatives, and those in between were able to find agreement in a context of mutual respect and fervent prayer. In finding common ground, we were able to discover the high ground.

Bishops Gregg, Marble, and I participated fully in the discussions and we support the actions of our House of Bishops. There is good reason to be hopeful that the response by the bishops will be positively received by the leadership of the Anglican Communion.

This is a significant accomplishment, a positive step, and a hopeful sign.



Coping with Illness During the Holidays

When there's illness in the house, holiday cheer can ring hollow. Here are some tips for reclaiming the season.

In our culture, the holidays are a time for parties, merriment, gift buying, decorating and family gatherings. But when we or someone we love is sick or injured, the bustle and glitter of this season can be jarring. Families already stretched to the limit by the demands of an illness wonder how they'll find the time or energy for shopping. Individuals already struggling with the isolation and depression of illness can feel further alienated when it seems the whole world is celebrating - while they stay at home.


Whatever your particular circumstances, it's important to remember you are not as alone as you may feel. Despite the images of universal gaiety we see on TV, the fact is many people struggle with the holidays. People who have recently lost a loved one or a job; people isolated by a recent move or divorce; people alienated by the prevailing commercialism - and people of non-Christian faith backgrounds all face the challenge of navigating a holiday season that deepens their sense of being "set apart" from the happy majority.

There is no magic formula for coping with the complex emotions the holidays can bring. But any one of the following ideas may help you and your family weather the hard moments--and savor the good times.

- Use the holiday season to stop and reflect on what really matters in your life. Illness and injury bring traumatic changes, but some good always remains. Identify the relationships and activities that bring you joy--and make time for the people and events that nourish your spirit and make you smile.
- Let others help. If your list of holiday list of "things to do" is overwhelming you, assign a few tasks to others. They'll get the satisfaction of helping--and you'll find you have a little more breathing room.

- Reach out. Friends and even family may not understand exactly how you're feeling, but they genuinely want to help. Sometimes just talking about your feelings of sadness or isolation can lighten the burden of those feelings.
- Consider a simpler approach to gift-giving. Tell all those friends who've been wanting to do something for you that they can help most by expecting no presents or cards this year. Within your own family, save time and deepen the true spirit of the season by giving personal gifts with no monetary value. A family I know made good use of this idea. One person agreed to read a story to another; one gave a 15-minute back rub; and a third family member offered to baby-sit one evening so a young couple could have a night out. Be creative and personal rather than expensive and commercial
- Savor the simple pleasures of the season. If you enjoy the decorations, ask a friend to take you for a night drive through well-decorated neighborhoods. If Christmas music carries happy memories, invite friends over to sing. If hosting your own party is too demanding, why not let a relative or church member know you would enjoy caroling from the local youth group.
- Even in the hospital, there is room for holiday cheer. One hospitalized patient made a Christmas Tree on her wall with cards wishing her well and hoping for healing. Though she longed to be home, she made her hospital room the next best thing by decorating it with the love of friends and family.
- Find a way to do something for somebody else. Living with an illness, acute or chronic, can be all-consuming. Avoid being defined by disease, by reaching beyond the limits and preoccupations of illness to connect with others. Send a card to someone you know who's sick or lonely. Or phone, just to let them know you're thinking about them. If you don't have the energy for direct contact, remember others who need help in your prayers. It may seem a small gesture, but we heal by helping others.
- Disease and disability can turn lives upside down. But whatever changes you face, you still have a spirit that needs nourishment and encouragement. This year--and in all the years to come--focus on the aspects of the holiday season that bring you joy and feed your love of life and of others. That's the true holiday spirit-and it's available to everyone.
