MAY FRIENDSHIP CELEBRATIONS

Dear CWU Sisters,

It's hard to believe that our May Friendship Celebration is about one month away, but time does fly even after a rather cold and windy winter. However, these beautiful spring days are cheery and full of hope.

The theme for our 2015 Celebrations is <u>Companions on a Journey</u>. The May Friendship Celebration will focus on the "Journey of the Caregiver." From a personal perspective, it is a journey that needs companions, and is often a lonely one as we watch over our loved ones. The writers of our program say that caregiving is a task entrusted to us by God. They also mention that sometimes caregivers don't take care of themselves, and we need to offer them our support. They conclude that like Simon of Cyrene helped Jesus carry the cross, we need to help lift the burden of others and asked, "How can we help to lighten the load of caregivers?"

From personal experience, I know it is difficult and sometimes stressful. Sometimes it is full of tears. On the other hand, loving and caring create special relationships. I was Mother's caregiver through recovery from breast cancer and later through declining health. She was able to care for her daily needs, so I continued to teach at UW-Platteville. I think that most difficult part was knowing that she would never be the strong mother I had known. When I retired from UWP, Mother was there. I will always remember her comment, "That's my child." Daily there are special little moments that serve as reminders of her. They are like little gifts. I know that many of you also have stories to tell about your experiences as a caregiver.

Suggestion:

 Earlier today, I Goggled "Caregiving." There are many topics to explore, and there might be ideas that you can incorporate into your May Friendship Program.

Other suggestions are:

- A speaker on caregiving, could be a caregiver or someone from a program on caregiving;
- A panel of caregivers;
- Bake something special to give to a caregiver;
- Write notes or send cards to caregivers;
- Do something special for caregivers, such as relieving them for a few hours, paying for a trip to a beauty salon or for a ticket to a movie;
- Telephone calls or email messages will be appreciated.

The May Friendship meeting will be very busy because we will also celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Fellowship of the Least Coin. The Leader's manual includes an excellent description of the Fellowship and its purpose. Note that the Aim Packet included a beautiful book, <u>Celebrating the Legacy</u>, <u>Visioning the Future</u>, <u>and Living the Jubilee</u>, containing many stories about the founding, recipients and special celebrations of the Fellowship of the Least Coin. You may want to include some of vignettes in your celebration and also give your members an opportunity to browse through the book.

Be creative as you plan. Supporting caregivers is ongoing, so keep it going. Let me know what you are doing for caregivers, and about your celebration of the Fellowship of the Least Coin. I will send your good ideas to other units.

ECUMENICAL ACTION

Opportunities for Ecumenical Action abound in April. Here are three possibilities:

April 15 - Action for the Fight for \$15 campaign

On April 15 low-wage workers across the country will join together in the fight for \$15 an hour and the right to unionize. They are asking for a wage that enables them to provide the basic needs for their families. The Fight for \$15 campaign started in 2012 in New York with 200 workers and has grown stronger every year. In 2014 the movement became a global campaign with actions in 33 countries. Actions are taking place in Madison and Milwaukee. April 22 - Earth Day

Creation Justice Ministries has a great resource for Earth Day 2015, "Have you anything here to eat?" Sustainable Food in a Changing Climate. Use it to reflect on the impact on us of food concerns and climate and the interaction of the two. How does food production and consumption affect the climate? How does climate change affect growing and accessing food? The resource includes materials for worship, Christian education, and suggestions for action. April 29 - Advocacy Day at the Capital: People of Faith United for Justice

Every two years people of faith come from all over Wisconsin for this day-long gathering to learn, discuss, pray and advocate for social justice issues. The morning plenary with speakers and issues briefing is followed by afternoon visits to our legislators. This is our opportunity to speak for justice and compassion to be reflected in the budget. This year's keynote speaker is Hannah Rosenthal, President of the Milwaukee Jewish Federation, and long-time advocate for social and economic justice. She has a long history of being active in public policy and building relationships within and between communities.

The keynote respondent is Rev. Everett Mitchell, Director of Community Relations, UW Madison, and Pastor of Christ the Solid Rock Baptist Church, Madison. His life focus has been to examine the relationship of the church to social issues, such as poverty, war, incarceration and immigration. A graduate of Princeton Theological Seminary and the University of Wisconsin-Madison Law School, Rev. Mitchell demonstrates community leadership and passion for social justice.

Registration received by April 15 is \$25 and includes lunch. For more information, visit the Wisconsin Council of Churches website (<u>wichurches.org</u>) where you can register online or download a brochure with registration form.

If you have never attended the Advocacy Day before, consider making this year the year you do. It is important that our legislators hear the voices for social justice and compassion as they work on the state budget that affects all the people of Wisconsin, including "the least of these."
