This executive summary of the School Accountability Report Card (SARC) is intended to provide parents and community members with a quick snapshot of information related to individual public schools. About This School

The Mountain Empire Unified School District is located in remote East San Diego County, nearly 45 miles east of the city of San Diego, with the International Border to Mexico on the south and Imperial County to the east. The region is surrounded by and includes large tracts of Cleveland National Forest. The population is economically and socially stratified with a small number of wealthy landowners, while a majority of the population consists of middle-income families, retirees, and families on assistance. The District encompasses approximately 660 sq. miles with a declining K-12 enrollment of slightly less than 1700 K-12 students, most of whom depend on district bussing to transport to and from school. This mountainous district ranges in elevation from 2,000 feet to almost 6,000 feet and serves the unincorporated communities of Descanso, Guatay, Pine Valley, Campo, Potrero, Boulevard, Lake Morena, Jacumba, as well as the Campo, La Posta and Manzanita Indian Reservations.

Mountain Empire Alternative Education Program is comprised of one continuation high school (Campi High), one community day school (Cottonwood Community Day), and one independent study junior/senior high school (Hillside). The program serves students in the $7^{th} - 12^{th}$ grades and adults. Our central location is in Campo, housing Campo High school and Hillside Jr./Sr. High School. Cottonwood Community Day School and Redhawk Academy are housed in back of the District Office. Since the last WASC, the Mountain Meadows site at Potrero Elementary School has been closed and the Campo Indian Education Center is run independently.

The Independent Study School was founded on August 28, 1995. It was named Hillside Jr./Sr. High School and approved by the Board on February 7, 1996. From 1993-1995, the Independent Study Program was housed at the comprehensive High School. During the 1995-1996 school year, the program relocated to its current site at 31360 Hwy 94, Campo. Current staffing includes two full-time instructional staff, Mrs. Dolan and Mrs. Sanger. Mrs. Reeder divides her time between all special education students at Campo High and Hillside Independent Study.

This school offers a comprehensive high school curriculum utilizing the Independent Study method of instruction for students who are motivated to study on their own. Students must enroll on a voluntary basis, a choice made by parents, students, counselor and administration. Independent study is an educational alternative that is meant to respond to the student's needs, interests, aptitudes and abilities. This form of instruction allows students to study at their own pace. It provides an alternative for students to achieve competence and mastery in basic skills. Independent study also offers flexibility in the design of an education program and offers effective educational choices to students and families. Since its opening date, enrollment has fluctuated from 57 to approximately 140 students, including adults. Hillside now has a cap of 45

We will provide career and occupational education to all students, as well as prepare students for ongoing trade and technical education, and college after high school. Personal support, guidance, and counseling services will be provided to each pupil.

The school's goal is to provide a high quality based alternative to regular high school classes for students who are required to work, as well as others who are unable to benefit from the traditional high school program. The faculty seeks to accomplish their mission by providing each student with an individualized learning program.

Types of Services Funded (Fiscal Year 2010–11)

Medical, psychological and social services are offered through several local providers. Southern Indian Health Council has clinics in Alpine and Campo, offering services to all families, and at no charge to tribal enrollees. They also have an ongoing offering of classes and support groups across the age-span. Similarly, Mountain Health and Community Services offer reduced fee services with clinics in Alpine and Campo. While they generously provide psychological support to the high school and some of our elementary sites, we do not receive those services at the alternative sites. We are currently engaged in dialogue to see how we might partner to provide this service. San Diego Youth Services offers a "Cool

Bed" program which several of our students have utilized. This program offers a safe placement for students who need some time and space from their caregiver, and is accepted in the community as it has no ties to the child welfare system. A third provider, Crossroads Family Center, is an integral partner in supporting students and families with counseling services. Additional services become available if court mandates authorize them.

Counselor tracks student's progress toward graduation and assists seniors in selecting a college or trade school.

The Army, Navy and Marines visit the Alternative Education sites and inform the students about their qualifications to join and the benefits of serving our country. We hope to expand these visits to include the Border Patrol and Coast Guard; and are working to include trade school and resources to our offering.

Attendance may be one of the first alert signals to a student in need of personal support. Our SART (School Attendance Review Team) process includes phone calls, letters, home visits and follow up are the first steps to intervention before considering the SARB process.

SST meetings take place before, during and after school in which many interventions are discussed.

Twenty-five percent of our students are special education. In the last three years the district management has cut our Special Ed staff from three full-time teachers down to one full-time teacher. Cottonwood Community Day School employs a full-time instructional aid/clerk/custodian/food service worker.

IX. Student Performance

Standardized Testing and Reporting Program

The Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR) Program consists of several key components, including:

- **California Standards Tests (CSTs)**, which include English-language arts (ELA) and mathematics in grades two through eleven; science in grades five, eight, and nine through eleven; and history-social science in grades eight, and nine through eleven.
- **California Modified Assessment (CMA)**, an alternate assessment that is based on modified achievement standards in ELA for grades three through eleven; mathematics for grades three through seven, Algebra I, and Geometry; and science in grades five and eight, and Life Science in grade ten. The CMA is designed to assess those students whose disabilities preclude them from achieving grade-level proficiency on an assessment of the California content standards with or without accommodations.
- **California Alternate Performance Assessment (CAPA)**, includes ELA and mathematics in grades two through eleven, and science for grades five, eight, and ten. The CAPA is given to those students with significant cognitive disabilities whose disabilities prevent them from taking either the CSTs with accommodations or modifications or the CMA with accommodations.

The assessments under the STAR Program show how well students are doing in relation to the state content standards. On each of these assessments, student scores are reported as performance levels.
